SILVICULTURE SURVEY TRAINING PROGRAM 2015 AND 2016

Background

- Yinka Dene Economic Development Limited Partnership Inc. (YLP) wholly owned by Wet'suwet'en First Nation.
- Burns Lake Community Forest (BLCF) contracted YLP to conduct Free Growing and Regeneration Performance Assessment surveys on its tenured area while providing training to local band members.
- Kim Forest Management Ltd. (KFM) was subcontracted by YLP to conduct the surveys as well as provide training.

Program Objectives

Overall objective of this training program is to ready interested band members to be able to conduct silviculture surveys effectively and eventually become accredited with the Province as an Accredited Silviculture Surveyor.

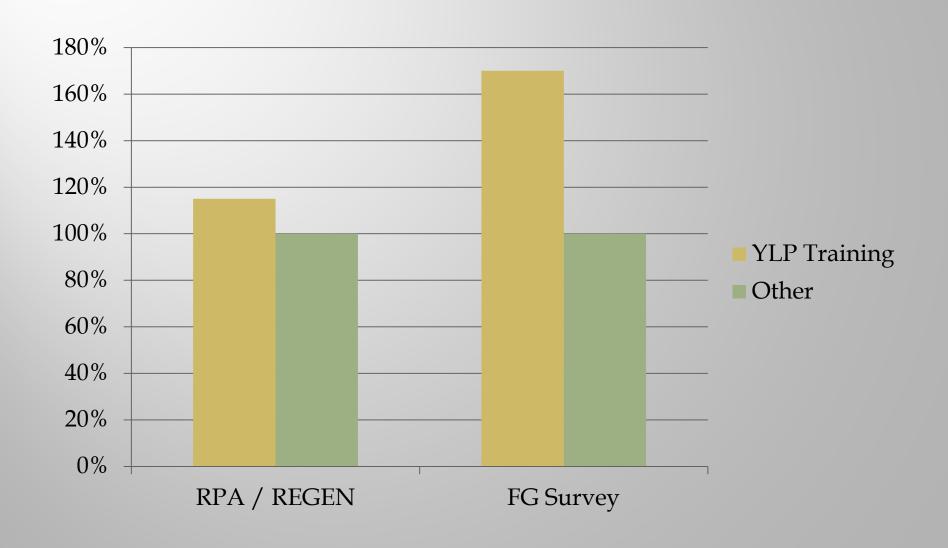

Who Pays Who?

- YLP holds the survey contract with Burns Lake Community Forest and gets paid by them for the survey work
- KFM is sub-contracted to complete the survey work and provide training and is paid by YLP
- YLP pays trainees' wage while being trained
- KFM provide training as a part of its negotiated survey rate

Cost Comparisons



Benefits for Parties Involved

BLCF

- Develop / maintain relationship with local First Nations
- Provide training to develop local capacity

YLP

- Build capacity within the First Nation community
- Provide much needed employment for members
- Further engage in forestry enterprises

KFM

- Identify perspective employees
- Train perspective employees at minimal costs

Challenges

- BLCF faces higher costs compared to industry standards
- Having the same trainees participate year after year would be most beneficial but has been difficult to achieve
- Relatively small contract
 - Short training window
 - Difficult to attract participants
- Office component of the work yet untested
